Gate City Too Far West for the Ohio Teams.
SHUT OUT OF WESTERN BASE BALL LEAGUE

MAGNATES OF THE LEASER SPORTING CONSTITUTIONS BELIEVE THAT THE CITY'S GEOGRAPHICAL LOCATION IS ALL WRONG.

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—The managers of the Western ball league are in session here today. The club circuit was completed this morning by admitting the Toledo and Columbus as charter members. Omaha was a competitor, but lost on account of geographical location. The league is now composed of the following clubs: Indianapolis, Detroit, Toledo and Columbus in the eastern division, and Milwaukee, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Kansas City in the western division.

On the last and 10th of each month the clubs will be assessed alike to defray the running expenses of the association.
