from Their Assailants. BROWNSVILLE, Ore., Nov. 20.—John Montgomery, his wife and D. B. McKeecher were found murdered at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon on the farm of S. O. Templeton three miles east of here. All three of the victims had been shot with a rifle and the murderers made good their escape. No moive is known for the crime. Montgomery was found lying on his back in the from yard near a picket fence with the top of his head blown off and his brains scattered over the fence. McKeecher was found in the sitting room lying on his face with a bullet wound in the left side of his head and part of his skull gone, and Montgomery's rifle was lying across his legs. face with a shot in the back. From their positions all were evidently fleeing from the nurderer. Excitement here is intense, and if the murderers are caught they will prob-ably be lynched. No one but the murdered people are known to have been on the prem
