

LEIDIGH STILL RUNS THE PRISON.

Warden in Control and Unabated as to the Churchill-Russell Board. LINCOLN, Dec. 17 .- (Special.) - Warden Leidigh says that all rumors that he is being supplied by the Board of Purchase and Supplies or the Board of Public Lands and Buildings with anything in the shape of maintenance for the convicts in his charge are false. Several papers in the state have circulated the report that the board had been supplying him with such maintenance during the pendency of his mandamus suit against the Board of Purchase and Supplies at the rate of 11½ cents a day per capita.
"They have not," said the warden today,
"given me as much as 11 cents all told since

the controversy about putting Contractor Beemer into the penitentiary came up. In fact, it would be impossible for them to do so, as they will be obliged to secure my signature to the vouchers before they can draw I penny of the legislative appropriation for the maintenance of convicte, and I am sure I have signed no such voucher. At present the warden is purchasing all the supplies necessary for an economical conduct of the penitentiary. Today he received two carloads of flour bought in the name of the state. One thing that evidently puzzles Warden Leidigh is the supreme court's construction of the term "man-damus." The warden says he instituted a mandamus suit under the impression that such an action would be given immediate precedence. Every other suit of the kind that has been commenced in the supreme court had been given dispatch but this one. It has now been delayed nearly three months.
