They also admit the receipt of various sums and the retention out of the same of his salary, and aver that the total amount he expended was \$21.143.62, instead of \$16.116.06. Therefore they ask that the case be dismissed and they have judgment for their costs.

IRRIGATION'S MANY PHASES

Convention at Sidney Discusses All Sides of the Question.

GOVERNOR HOLCOMB'S SPLENDID OVATION

Movement Looking to Practical Dems onstration of Proposed Methods Introduced-Many Valuable Papers Read.

SIDNEY, Neb., Dec. 19 .- (Special Telegram.)-The second day's session opened at 9:30 this morning with Major T. S. Clarkson of Omaha in the chair. After the invocation by Rev. Frank H. Strout, the election of officers occurred. The following were elected for the ensuing year: A. G. Wolfenberger, president; James L. McIntosh, secretary; Joseph Oberfelder, treasurer; I. A. Fort, state lecturer. The location of the next convention in October, 1896, brought out great deal of discussion, the contention being between Lincoln and Lexington. When the call of delegates had been half completed, it was evident that Lexington would be the victor, whereupon Hon. Ed Sizer of Lincoln moved that Lexington be named as the place for the next convention. The delegates took the position that they preferred to have the meeting where practical irrigation was demonstrated and Dawson county is well provided, and is making further efforts in that direction.

Governo: Holcomb received a splendid ovation as he arose to address the convention and several minutes clapsed before he could begin. His address was full of brilliant thoughts and showed a perfect knowledge of the all-important question for Nebraska. He assured the people that he would do all in his power to advance the cause of irri-gation. The address occupied an hour. Shortly afterward all the children attending the public schools entered the hall. Governor Holcomb delivered a very pretty address to them, after which the entire audience rose and gave three cheers for the chief executive of the state. The governor was much pleased

IN THE AFTERNOON.

The first subject for the afterneon's session was a paper by Hen. Charles W. Irish. Washington, chief of the irrigation division of the Agricultural department. Paper: "The Comparative Advantages of the Three Methods of Irrigation," Hon. John H. Powers, atate labor commissioner, Lincoln. "Practical and Local Irrigation," was the theme selected by Major Clarkson. He showed the practical results of irrigation and all of its advantages. "Irrigation and its Possibilities and the Right of District Law," by Hon. J. F. Gantt, was clearly demonstrated. In addition to the president, secretary and treas-urer, the following gentlemen were added to the state executive committee: Major Clark-Many compliments have been paid to this city for the excellent entertainment of the

delegates, and several resolutions commendatory of the action of the citizens here have been unanimously passed. The city is covered with flags and bunting. The convention hall is a marvel of neatness, and its artistic properties cannot be excelled. Another large and appreciative audience greeted the speakers tonight. Nearly 1,500 cople occupied seats in the auditorium of the convention hall. At this juncture a resolution was introduced thanking the Nebruska fish commissioners for the beautiful exhibit they made during the session of the convention. NEW NEBRASKA ORGANIZATION.
