CHICAGO, Feb. 7.—Some scare figures from Liverpool on European clearances brought about a radical change in wheat today, and the market after opening with all the ear marks of bear day, closed higher. Corn and oats were helped by wheat, and closed slightly stronger, but provisions made material recessions. In wheat there was less doing, the market at times ruling quite slow, the range for the session being 1%c. There was more disposition to make the long wheat, and while the pressure was at no time very urgent it exceeded the demand and caused the early weakness. There were three quite bearish items in the early news. Liverpool was quoted ½d lower than at the close of the day before as cabled to the Board of Trade, but a private cablegram, which pressumably covered a later hour at Liverpool than the public message, said id lower, owing to disappointing demand for spot wheat. NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—In the more extended character of the inquiry for all descriptions of cottons there has been a very good improvement and much more husiness has been effected than for many days. The salutary sitest of the surplus subscriptions to the bond bids becomes more marked every hour, yet the purchasing trade requires time to adjust affairs and get to work; hence improvement will be slow, but certain. Printing cloths disclose more tusiness doing, as the sales for the week are 189,600 piaces.

LIBERAL ORDERS FOR STEEL RAILS

Orders for Woolen Goods, Other Than

have been booked for nearly 300,000 tons of rails this year, against total deliveries in 1895 of 1,000,000 tons, and orders for wire nails are stimulated by a decision to advance the price again on March 1. There is also a more active demand for plates and sheets. Southern competition lowers coke iron at Chicago and-prevents advance at the east, while sales of last year's speculators in the Pittsburg region still depress bessemer. The ore pool is expected to fix the price for the year at \$4, or possibly \$4.50, and the coke pool still further reduced the output. Speculation has raised copper to 194c, with sales of \$6.00,000 pounds, and tin to 124c, and lead at \$3.10, with large imports of Mexican. Sales of wool have been 4,56,200 pounds, against \$1.92,150 pounds last year, and \$6.56,715 in 1933, with activity in clay worsteds and in mixtures. The orders for other woolen goods are still unusually delayed. It is also stated that cancellations in caspets have been unusually numerous since January 1.

The cotton mills continue generally active though talk of decreasing productions still continues. Print cloths do not rise above 2%c, and some goods tend lower.

Speculation in wheat has again lifted prices, atthough western receipts have been 2,500,507 bushels for the week, against 172,791 bushels last year, and for the year thus far 15,067,955 bushels, against 6,029,933 bushels last year. Atlantic exports have been increasing, though not in the same proportion, amounting for the week, four included, to 1,565,956 bushels, against 1,458,255 bushels, against 1,458,255 bushels hast year. The speculative market has been largely influenced by rumors of injury to the coming crop and by foreign advices, and prices advanced 3½c for cash and 2%c for May. Corn has been comparatively steady. Cotton is practically unchanged, receipts continuing to accord with a yield of about 7,000,000 bales for 1895.
