Persecuted Christians. BUFFALO, Feb. 10.—Nearly all the Protestant churches of Buffalo, with soveral Jew- Home Industries ish congregations, united in twenty-five places of worship last night in simultaneous meetings to protest against the Armenian outrages. A uniform resolution was adopted at the several meetings calling on congress and the executive branch of the United States and the executive branch of the United States government to take each immediate action as will effectively restrain the Turkish government and subjects from further murder and outrages in Armenia, and demanding that commissioners from this government be at once dispatched to Turkey to see that our demands are complied with. A large contribution for relief work in the stricken provinces was taken up at the meetings.
