Government Report Found Business Quite Dull in Grain.

CHICAGO, March 10.—The government report is not always indicative to activity in the speculative markets and today being one of these occasions business was quiet. That, however, did not prevent a decline of the price per bushel of wheat. Corn and oats made scarcely any change in their price. Provisions opened at a good advance and closed with all the opening improvement. The market was shaded against a respite of the price of ribs.

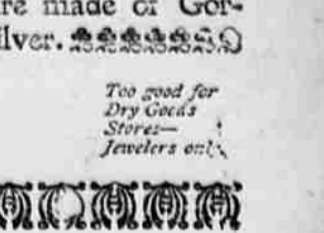
