The Boston investors incorporated as the Alaska & Boston company and \$100,000 was paid in. Henry E. Spaulding and G. T. W. Braman, the latter being at the head of the West Side electrical roads, came to this city and at once began preparations for the expedition.

The destination of the expedition has been most carefully guarded, but it is known that the objective point is about twenty miles from Resurrection creek at the head of Cook's inlet.

BIG SCHEME TO SMUGGLE CHINESE

Government Officials Rendy to Stop Swindling on a Large Scale. He is accused of swearing faisely to a pissport which enabled a Chinaman, whose name is for the present withheld by the authorities, to cross the Canadian border in Vermont on the grounds Canadian border in Vermont on the grounds that the Chinaman was engaged in business at Newark. Burns was arraigned before United States Commissioner Whitehead and after pleading not guilty was sent to jail in default of \$500 bail, pending a hearing.

According to statements made last night, it is the belief of the government officials that a gang of Chinese with shrewd allies is doing an extensive business in bogus passports. Their headquarters are in Newark.
