

DO NOT SIGN A STIPULATION

Farmers Mutual Officers and Attorney General Churchill Cannot Agree. NOTHING COMES OF THEIR CONFERENCE

Proposition of the State Examined and Rejected by the Insurance People and the Case Left Unchanged.

LINCOLN, May 5.—(Special)—Counsel for the Farmers' Mutual Insurance company of Lincoln, accompanied by President Woods, today walked upon Attorney General Churchill for the purpose of arranging the terms of a stipulation between the company and State Auditor Moore by which everything but the question of promissory notes taken for insurance could be eliminated from the answer of the latter to the petition of the company. This petition is in the nature of an application for a writ of mandamus to compel the auditor to issue to the company a certificate to do business. The stipulation was drawn up by the attorney general, but when this was presented to the officers of the Farmers' Mutual Insurance company they refused to sign it.

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Spentid Crop Prospects. NORTH LOOP, Neb., May 5.—(Special)—Not in the memory of the proverbial "oldest inhabitant" has the spring opened more promisingly than is the case this year.
