Dealt in Indian Cattle. The jury in the case of John W. Peterson against the Swift Packing company, in the United States court, returned a verdict in favor of the defendant.

The case now before the court is that of Ida M. Baker, guardian of the three children of Ward Baker, deceased, against the New York Life Insurance company, asking judgment on a \$5,000 policy. Baker made application for a policy in June, 1893, and died the following December. The company has persisted in refusing to pay the claim, alleging that Baker resorted to misrepresentation in his application.
