### PROMISES TO DRAW A BIG CROWD.

**Interest in the Coming Rosewater-Bryan Debate Continues.**

Admission tickets for the debate were distributed equally between Mr. Rosewater and Mr. Bryan, Wednesday morning. ### TWO MILITARY PRISONERS CAUGHT.

**Ganzer and Nagle in the Guard House Again.**  
Two of the warriors bold who escaped from the guard house at Fort Omaha last Monday night are back again. These two are the white soldiers, Nagle and Ganzer. The colored boy in blue, Wyatt, is still missing.

Ganzer dropped around late Wednesday evening somewhat the worse for wear. He had decided that liberty was not such a sweet thing after all, when it had to be enjoyed in prison marked clothes. In fact he rather preferred the guard house, where he could at least get three meals a day, which sweet liberty had cruelly failed to net him.

Nagle was caught yesterday morning on the bottom near South Omaha. He had managed to crawl along the river bank unobserved, as he thought. He was, however, seen by some passerby and was tipped off. The officers brought him to the station at noon and then took him to the fort to claim the \$10 reward for his capture.

The return of the wandering boys has not yet been reported at headquarters and therefore no action has been taken on their cases. Nagle's little escapade is likely to act as a boomerang, as he can be tried for desertion again. If he is found guilty he will begin on the sentence after he has finished serving his present sentence for desertion.

### KEEFE IS THE LOWEST BIDDER.

**Proposals for Commanding Officer's Quarters at Fort Crook.**  
Bids for the construction and fitting of the commanding officer's quarters at Fort Crook were opened at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the office of the chief quartermaster of the Department of the Platte. There were but two bidders, Moses P. Keefe of this city and J. H. Eggers of South Omaha. The final acceptance or rejection of the bids must be made by the War department at Washington, but the bids will be forwarded with the recommendation that the award be made to Keefe, as he is the lowest bidder and a responsible party.

Keefe's bid for the construction of the building was \$9,200, while that of Eggers was \$11,200. For putting in the apparatus for heating the structure by steam, Keefe bid \$50, Eggers \$75 and Theodore Houck \$84; for plumbing Keefe bid \$74, Eggers \$75 and Houck \$62; for gas piping Keefe bid \$40, Eggers \$75 and Houck \$65. The structure is to be one of the handsomest and most substantial at the post. It will be a two-story and basement brick building, 50x30 feet, crowned by an attic.

### CASES IN UNITED STATES COURT.

**Indictments Against Parties Who Death in Indian Cattle.**  
The jury in the case of John W. Peterson against the Swift Packing company, in the United States court, returned a verdict in favor of the defendant.

The case now before the court is that of Ida M. Baker, guardian of the three children of Ward Baker, deceased, against the New York Life Insurance company, asking judgment on a \$5,000 policy. Baker made application for a policy in June, 1893, and died the following December. The company refused to pay the claim, alleging that Baker resorted to misrepresentation in his application.

The grand jury returned indictments against William Frank Randall for stealing a car load of "I. D." cattle from the Pine Ridge Indian reservation, and also against W. H. Ryan, the Gordon butcher, who purchased the stolen cattle. The Randall is in jail and Ryan is out on a \$1,000 bond.
