

CORN AND FINANCIAL

Small Increase in the Visible Supply Caused a Decline. Other Features of the Wheat Trade. There was Only a Moderate Trade Early, but Later, After the Decline, Business Was More brisk.

CHICAGO, May 18.—Crops improvements, Russian shipments and the small decrease in the visible supply caused a sharp decline in wheat today. July closed easy at 61 1/2, and high today Saturday's close. Corn prices were dull but steady and provisions rather heavy in the end. In wheat there was only a moderate trade early, but later, after the decline, there was more doing. The news at hand outside of advice from late seedling in the northwest, were "bearish" and had a very depressing effect on the market. The street, however, from May 16 to 18, gradually declined 1/2, rallied 1/4, changed some and closed as stated. Among the early influences which affected the market was the report of a heavy crop in the northwest, and the liberal northwestern receipts which were expected to be a heavy crop. The world's shipments showed the same large amount, and was quite a fall in private advice. The Black Sea shipments 5,000,000 bu., and the total 8,000,000 bu. New York wired that 1,100,000 gold had been engaged for shipment tomorrow. The small decrease in the visible supply added considerable to the decline. The market was better at Duluth than expected, but not so large as looked for on the 18th.
