the Road Race. Consummation of the Deal for the Omaha & St. Louis.

FULL OF SIGNIFICANCE FOR OMAHA

Menns a Direct Outlet to the South and Eventually One to be East Independent of Chlengo.

Ever since the sale of the Omaha & St. Lou's railroad in January last there has been much conjecture as to the identity of the real purchasers. Fanciful writers at various times placed the road in the hands of the Santa Fe, then again have stated that the Baltimore & Ohio system had secured the road, and even suggested that the Burlington would soon take possession of it in order to secure a short route from Omaha to St. Louis.

All doubts were yesterday morning set aside by the receipt of a message by W. Farnam Smith of th's city. It was from a prominent financier of New York and stated that the deal for the possession of the Omaha & St. Louis railroad by the Drexel syndicate had just been completed and that the syndicate would take full charge of the road on July 1, 1896.

This settlement of the much disputed question, it is thought, will prove another step toward advancing the construction of a north and south line, the Drexel interests being closely connected with those of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Trust company of Kansas City. The latter is the company that has the proposed Kansas City and Northerna road in hand. President Stillwell of that company has just returned from Europe, where it is said he was very successful in the raising of funds for building the proposed line. "Arrangements have already been completed

for building a line from Pationsburg, Mo., to Trenton, Mo.," said John R. Webster of the Bridge and Terminal company to a Bee reporter this morning. "All arrangements are also made for the construction of a road from Pattonburg south to Kansas City. It is not true, however, that definite plans have been agreed upon for building from Quincy to Beardstown. It is not impossible, however that will come around later." President Arthur S. Potter of the Bridge and Terminal company will return this morning from Chicago. He has been in Kansas City the last few days in consultation with President Stillwell. Now that it is
