A request from the People's church for the use of an election booth for Sunday school purposes was referred to the committee on ublic property and buildings. The Board of Public Works was author ized to expend \$75 in removing ponds of stagnant water at Twenty-seventh and Bristol

streets. There was an extended controversy over report of the finance committee in which the Board of Fire and Police commissioners was recommended. These are the claims for which the Leeder case was made a test case and in which the courts decided that the city must settle. They aggregate about \$1,700 Hascall moved an amendment that the claims be allowed and ordered placed in the next appropriation ordinance to be paid out of the fire fund. He made a vigorous fight for his motion, but lost by a tie vote. Then the committee report was adopted. The members stated that they would vote to pay the claims, but thought that the matter should come up as a recommendation from the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners. The city engineer was directed to prepare plans and estimates on the construction of a torm water culvert at Forty-third and Ham ilton streets.


