CUTS OFF TWO LETTER CARRIERS. Latey Succeeds Kleffner as Superintendent_Changes Effective Monday.

Word was received in Omaha yesterday morning that the postal authorities at Washington had decided to reduce the force of rate tickets to Washington will be sold to all carriers in connection with the local post-applicants July 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th, via office. Stone, Joseph Becker and George Ahmanson, are reduced to substitute carriers by the new order.
All these changes are effective June 1

Just how seriously they will handicap the work of the local office is not known, as neither Postmaster Martin nor his assistant. Mr. Woodward, could be seen yesterday. While the reduction of Superintendent Kleffner to the position of carrier is generally regretted, it does not come as a surprise to those conversant with postal matters. It is said that First Assistant Postmaster General Jones refused to confirm the ap-pointment of any superintendent of carriers who belonged to the National Association of Letter Catriers. This is given as the reason for the appointment of Mr. Latey, a member of the National Association of Postal Clerks.

KLEFFNER FOUGHT THE ORDER. It was stated yesterday by a prominent citizen of this city, who is thoroughly con-versant with the situation, that the only reason why Kleffner has been turned down is because of the antipathy of First Assistant Postmaster General Jones to the National Association of Letter Carriers. Kleffner has been actively in erested in the work of the association ever since its organization. He was one of its first presidents and served for several years as chairman of its executive board.

This organization has been exceedingly active in its work on behalf of the carriers It was largely instrumental in bringing ab u the passage of the eight-hour law, which the government fought through all the courts. It also succeeded in having the appropriation for the employment of spies on the carriers knecked out by congress. movements on the part of the association has, it is understood, annoved Assistan Jones to such an extent that he has deter-mined to get back at the prominent officers of the association by reducing them to in

The idea of selecting a clerk for the position of superintendent of carriers is ridiculed by the majority of postal employes. They contend that a man who has not served as a carrier himself has not had sufficient training to properly occupy the position of super-intendent of carriers. Posimaster Martin is said not to favor the change at all. On June 1, when the present clerk succeeds the present superintendent of carriers, an effort will be made to reduce the salary of the

The Na-tional Association of Letter Carriers has tional Association of Letter Carriers has taken the matter up, and through its attorneys at Washington, will enter a vigorous protest against the appointment of a postal clerk to the position of superintendent of carriers. A protest will first be entered before the local civil service board, and then the matter will be carried to the national civil service commission. One of the post civil service commission. One of the most interesting fights that the combined forces

of letter carriers has yet waged is promised in the behalf of its ex-president.

Postmaster Euclid Martin stated in con nection with the matter that the three men had been placed on the substitute list in compliance with retrenchment orders from Washington. Omaha is only one of a large number of cities of the same class which have had their mail carrier forces reduced. In a number of cities the force has been reduced ten men. Mr. Martin regarded the suspension of the men as lemporary, and stated that as soon as orlers for increased force were received from

Washington the substitutes always had the preference over outside parties.

Earl W. Tate, one of the special delivery letter carriers, said to have been one of the employes discharged, resigned of his own imployes discharged, resigned of his been occord, and the vacancy has already been diled. 
