waiting for better prices. There is said to be a great deal of grain stored in the Chicago elevators that has been brought in by the western roads. It is being held there because the roads east of Chicago have not yet cut down their rates. It is probable, however, that these lines will soon lower their grain rates in order to successfully compete with the Gulf roads. The roads from here to Chicago say they cannot further aid in reducing these rates, as they have already gone down very lowest notch. So if there is to be any further cutting it must be done east of Chicago. It is noticeable that the lake lines are carrying more grain east of Chicago, at present, than the all rail routes.
