That section eleven (11) of arti-cle six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as fol-lows: Beetion 11. The legislature, whenever two-thirds of the members elected to each house shall concur therein, may, in or after the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven and not oftener than once in every four years, increase the number of judges of supreme and district courts, and the judicial districts of the state. Such districts shall be formed of compact terri-tory, and bounded by county lines; and such increase, or any change in the houndaries of a district, shall not vacate the office of any judge.
