C. H. Frank and Emanuel Klein were first arrested on suspicion of having com-mitted the assault and placed in the sweat box by Captain Haze shortly after they were taken to the station, and, being somewhat scared at the position in which they found themselves, at length divulged the name of the party whom they assert did the job. They laid the crime at the door of Emil Lund, nicknamed 'Punk.'
They stated that Lund and themselves

were scated at a table in the saloon, when Clark, who has been a hanger-on at the place for several weeks past, walked over to the cigar counter and attempted to help himself to the contents of the case. He was ordered away by Lawler, the bar-keeper, but did not immediately comply. Clark, who was partly intextcated, resisted and Lund took him in hand, and finally forced him into the alley, where a fight ensued, in which Lund knocked Clark down. Lund then came to the front part of the saloon, where he remained a few minutes, and then left. That was the last they saw

He maintained, how-ever, that it had been in self-defense, that Clark had struck at him when they reached the door and that he had only struck Clark the one blow. He did not know that he had seriously injured Clark when he returned to the saloon immediately after the affray. but became alarmed when Lawler had gone to Clark's assistance, and then made good to Clark's assistance, and then made good his escape. He went immediately to Mul-vihil's place of business on Harney, near Fiftcenth street, and from there to Bou-quette's livery barn. He then returned to the music hall for his clothing. Lund says that he did not use any brass knuckles in the assault, although his right hand is badly bruised as a result of the encounter.

TELLS A DIFFERENT STORY. O. Rogers, a broom vender, who changed to be passing up the alley at the time of the assault and claims to be an eyewitness gives a different version of the affair. He says that Lund upon shoying Clark into the alley struck him in the face with all his force and that Clark had made no attempt to strike Lund. Lawler, the barkeeper of the place, robora'es the statements made by Frank and Klein, although he heard nothing of the conversation between Lund and Rogers and did not witness the assault. He says that although Lund has drank considerable in former times, he was entirely sober yesterday and, in fact, has not been ad-dicted to drink for over a month past. Clark, he says, has been drunk most of the time during the last few months and has put in a large portion of his time hanging around the saloon.

Clark was formerly employed as a clerk t the Ogden hotel in Council Bluffs, but left there three months ago. He then went to South Omsha, where he worked at the Reed hotel for a short period, and then Reed hotel for a short period, and then came to this city. He secured employment at the Delione hotel last Sunday morning, but left that place Tuesday noon, since which time he had been idle. Lund has held a fairly good reputation among his friends and is the son of a prominent insurance man of this city. 

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
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
