Three Plans Under Discussion, One of Which Involves Diverting the Channel of the Missouri River.

The residents of the southeastern part of the city who constitute the Southside Improvement club are lying awake nights trying to devise schemes to increase the popularity of their beloved Riverview park.

The latest scheme has for its object the diverting of a lake which shall be more than a mere stream. The park is already provided with an artesian well 1,000 feet in depth, which has a flow of water six inches in diameter and has developed force enough to run a mill.
