One of the chief factors of the opening firmness was the strength displayed in the foreign markets. Liverpool was quoted as opening fire at bed per cental advance and London at 5d per quarter higher for American wheat. A paragraph from the Liverpool Corn Trade News was being paraded near the opening which said that the general impression there of the size of this year's American wheat crop was that it would be about 470,000,000 bu and that wheat would be 5s per quarter higher in the United Kingdom. They believed it to be materially smaller than that. The northwestern receipts commenced today to exhibit a contrast to those of the corresponding time of the year before. There is still some of that great crop left, but the daily exhibit of the Minneapolis and Duluth receipts will, nevertheless, show a great discrepancy compared with this year's. The two cities received 28 cars today as against 408 cars a year ago. The Atlantic port clearances were equal to 185,000 bu, of flour and wheat together. Closing cablegrams confirmed the strength reported of the foreign markets at the opening, but the market exhibited all its strength in taking the little jump it did at the start. After the early advance business got slow and stocks getting weaker there was about as much effort to sell as there had been to buy early and all the improvement was lost. OMAHA-ST. LOUIS RATE IS CUT

Packing House Products May Go for Thirteen and a Half Cents.

MISSOURI PACIFIC OUT OF THE WAR

Rate to New Orleans is Thirty-Two Cents, but the Road is Not Making Any Cut on Eastern Business.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 20.-The Burlington today lowered its rate on packing bouse product for export from Omaha to the east bank of the Mississippi river to 131/2 cents. The Missouri Pacific has put in a rate on oleo stock and neutral lard, South Omaha to New Orleans for export, of 32 cents. The Missouri Pacific people do not think there is any money in hauling the business at the present rates and do not wish to be drawn into the controversy pending between the lines leading east from the Missouri

ATLANTIC IS FIGHTING THE GULF.

Cut in Freight Rates on Packing

House Products Going East. KANSAS CITY, Aug. 20.—The Wabash and Santa Fe railroads today met the 8-cent rate per 100 on lard, tallow, oleo, oil, grease and canned meats from Kansas City to the Mississippi made yesterday by the Alton. The Santa Fe followed suit in part by making the same rate on oleo, oll, lard, stearine and tallow for export and a rate of 1334 cents on other packing house products. This is in the interest of Atlantic against Gulf port shippers and apparently is the beginning of

another interesting freight rate war. Western freight rates are now in a worse condition than they have been for a long time. The fight between the Chicago roads and the Gulf lines for the grain traffic of the transmissouri territory is being waged with great bitterness and at present the Gulf lines seem to be having the best of the struggle. Although rates have been reduced one-balf between Chicago and the Missouri river and one-third between Chicago and the seaboard, there is much of the grain going by the New Orleans and the Galveston gate-ways. The western roads do not at present see how they can reduce rates more without losing money and they are anxious that their eastern connections shall come to their relief. The latter, however, seem to be fairly well satisfied with their action in reducing the rates by one-third and the pres-ent indications are that the western roads will be left to work out their salvation in the best way they can.
