

## JOHN R. GENTRY ON THE MARK

World's Pacing Record Made by Robert J is Equalled by His Rival.

STAR POINTER FORCES HIM THROUGH

Match Race Between, the Great Stallions Proves an Unpanally Exciting One, with a Most Wonderful Result.

GLEN FALLS, N. Y., Sept. 10.-The first of the series of three races between the great pacing stallion, John R. Gentry (2:03%), and Star Pointer (2:04%), for a purse of \$5,000, with \$500 added by the association should the track record of 2:03 be beaten, took place today on the track of the Northern New York Trotting Horse Breeders' association at Glen Falls. Last week at Fleetwood John R. Gentry lowered the colors of Robert J. Frank Agan and Star Pointer, winning the most remarkable harness race on record, pacing the fastest three consecutive miles known. Today the same handsome stallion equaled the world's record, made by Robert J at Terre Haute two years ago, going a mile and winning the heat by almost a full length in 2:011/2 The average time of three heats of today's race was just one-fourth of a second slower than the world's record made at Fleetwood last week.

This match brought out upwards of 7,000 people. The horses looked fit to make the race of their lives. Shortly before 3:30 the first heat of the big event was called. Gentry came first on the track and received an ovation as he passed the grand stand. Star Pointer followed quickly, and was equally well received. The pools were sellequally well received. ng 1 to 2 on John R. Gentry, and 6 to 5 on Star Pointer. They closed at 5 to 2 on Gentry. They were given the word on the second score. Star Pointer had the pole. They started very level, and held the position from the wire to the half mile pole, with Gentry at Star Pointer's saddle. drews let out a loop and Gentry closed up the distance, but a moment back to Star Pointer's seat. As they sped around into the home stretch, the stal lions were as if in one harness. Then with furious drive, the Fleetwood record nelder, pushed his nose ahead and won the heat in 2:03%.

The second heat was called at 4 o'clock At that time quite a breeze was blowing, and this seemed to dampen all hopes of a record breaking performance. The horses were given the word on the first score, and a more magnificent race was never witnessed. They went along as one horse to the five-eighths pole, where Star Pointer, who was on the outside, straining every muscle, managed to show his head in front. Into the stretch they came, and as Andrews shook up his horse, John R. Gen-try, with a wonderful burst of speed, flew past his rivals, passing under the wire a full length in front, with a world's record o his account of 2:0116. Every person in the vast assemblage went wild, for it seemed, even before the time was posted that a record had gone down.

After such a wonderful performance the third heat proved somewhat of a disappointment. They got off on the first score and, after traveling the first heat neck and neck. Star Pointer went back to Gentry's He closed again to the stretch when Andrews again made his drive, and Gentry took the third heat in 2:05%. Time by quarters:
