

MICROSCOPE AS A MEDICAL AGENT.

After this, perhaps, you will hardly be so skeptical as to the value of the expert testimeny that is often introduced in the murder trials as to microscopic examinations of the blood. Provided that the blood be reasonably fresh, it is not at all difficult to determine from what kind of an animal t came. Then again, blood shows very differently under varying conditions of health and disease. It is regarded by some as possible to anticipate a number of differ-ent diseases simply from an examination of a drop of venous blood that the prick of a pin on your hand will draw. In the condition of health the corpuscies will be free, separated and clear; in disease they will be stringy, run together and clotted. Just what will be the final estimate as to the value of this microscopical examination to medicine the physicians are as yet at wide variance.
