The Northern Pacific railway will erect at Sumas, Wash., with a capacity of about 2,000 handles a day. It is proposed to increase the capacity of the factory to 7,000 handles a day before long.

The Rosario Straits Packing company shipped a case of salmon from its new cannery at Anacortes. Nearly 8,000 salmon daily have been brought to the cannery from the coast.

At Thirard, Idaho, Frank Jenkins recently ran into one of too low grade to pay expenses. He called his men together and told them to go to work and get the other wages, but offered to let them take the mill and mine for sixty days and run them on the profit sharing system.

The roads of Riverside's desert section are to be provided with sign posts giving directions where to go. Yosemite valley has also been dug about half way between Palm Springs and Indio.

Turquoise in the rough, from the famous mine in New Mexico, near Santa Fe, is being cut into jewels at San Francisco for export to the east. They have been discovered early in the sixteenth century, and besides one in Persia, is the only known genuine turquoise mine in the world.
