Another class of merchandise that is moving freely is what might be termed cold weather goods, such as stoves, stove pipe and the furniture and fixtures that usually go with stoves, and all kinds of heavy wearing apparel. Boots and shoes are meeting with fair sale, though the orders are so small that a local botter says he is expecting apparel. Books and shoes are meeting wit-fair sale, though the orders are so smal that a local jobber says he is expecting every day to have some one send in an orde for one shoe for a one-legged man. Conscious are poor in practically every branch of business and are likely to remain so for some weeks, until the new corn crop begins to move freely. At the present time there is very little money in the country.

The tendency of prices is pretty generally upward, and, while not many advances have been scored, such changes as have taken place have generally been in that direction leading jobbers to believe that the bottom has been touched.

While it must be admitted that the immediate future does not present a very flowery outlook, the close observer can detect a shaping of events which, if continued, must lead to a most decided improvement before the close of many more weeks. The most hopeful feature of the present situation is the rapid advance that has taken place in the grain market during the past few weeks.

MEANS MANY MILLIONS OF MONEY.

MEANS MANY MILLIONS OF MONEY. While the enormous grain crop grown in lebraska this year promised an abundance Nebraska this year promised an abundance of feed, prices were so low a few weeks ago that prospects for business were far from bright, but the recent advances have put quite a different phase on the subject. According to the government estimates. Nebraska will have a corn crop amounting to about 300,000,000 bushels. Six weeks and No. 2 corn sold down to 19% cents in Chicago, but at the close of the past week it touched 35% cents an advance of 6 cents. while perhaps not over 30 per cent of the crop remains in the state unsold, there is still enough to add several millions of

dollars to the wealth of the farmers.

Pork has advanced about \$1 per barrel, so that the farmers are receiving considerably more for their live hogs.

As a matter of fact not near all the corn grown in the state will be sold, farmers reserving a large percentage for feed, so that in calculating the advantages of the gain to the farmer arising from the im-provement in the market up to \$18.00.20 at least. It all depends, however, upon whether present advances can be main-tained, but in this respect the outlook is certainly favorable, as short crops are reported in most foreign countries, and there is every prospect of a large export demand. Prices may even advance much higher before the coming of a new year.

The men who solicit freight say that the pros-pect of McKinier's election is undoubtedly one of the ressons if not the principal rea-son, for the increased number of orders that are coming into the local jobbers from the state. The movement of merchandise is five or six times as large as it was thirty days ago. This is the class of freight that pays best, and freight men feel jubilant when it begins to move along lively. The months of October and November are always those in which the railroads make their best showing, and from indications it is 1896 pretty certain that these months in will not prove exceptions to the general rule.
