SUPREME COURT SYLLABL. irdson county. Reversed and remanded. Opinion by Chief Justice Post. Section 1 of the criminal code is declara-tory merely of the common law rule by tory merely of the common law rule by which an accessory before the fact is defined as one who aids, abets or procures the commission of a felony by another in his absence, and does not refer to one who, being present at the commission of the crime, aids or assists therein.

2. In those jurisdictions where, as in this state, the rule of common law has not been relaxed, one charged as a principal only cannot be convicted as an accessory, and one charged as an accessory before the fact cannot be convicted as a principal of fender.

I Am alibi is a legitimate defense to a criminal charge and should not be disparaged by the trial court, the weight or sufficiency of the evidence for that purpose being a question for the consideration of the fairy.

It is error to instruct that the accused in a criminal prosecution is required to prove an alibi. It is sufficient to entitle him to an acoustral if the jury from a consideration of all of the evidence, entertains a reasonable doubt of his presence at the commission of the orime charged whether such doubt arises from a failure of proof on the part of the state or from evidence submitted by the accused in his own behalf.
