NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The first post-election rading on the Stock exchange this morning was strong in tone and buoyant in character, and for the first quarter of an hour prices rose sharply. The advances ranged up to 7 per cent, with Sugar as the leader of the market. There was, The advances ranged up to 7 per cent, with Sugar as the leader of the market. There was, however, a feverishness about the transaction which quickly led to realizing rates, resulting in reactions of about 1 to 2½ per cent. These were followed by sharp but only partial recoveries, the dealings meanwhile beling on an enormous scale and reaching proportions that have not been witnessed for a long time. There was good buying on orders from out of town, which was stimulated by the receipt of cable advices reporting higher prices for American securities on the London Stock exchange. Foreign buying onters were executed in fairly large volume, and materially assisted in the upward movement. There was, however, large selling for the account of operators, who desired to take advantage of the rise which was expected to occur in the initial dealing, opinions differing as to the stability of the advance. The hour preceding moon was marked by a fairly steady tone on a moderate business, which brought the market to about its normal condition. Approaching midday, the market was again on the upward turn, and the specialties attained considerable prominence by reason of wide fluctuations.

A Few Choice Cattle Sold at Strong Prices During the Session.
CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—A few choice cattle sold t strong prices, but other kinds were slow and ragging at barely steady quotations. Sales of native beef steers were on a basis of from \$3.55 to \$3.75 for very common lots, up to from \$5 to \$5.25 for prime to fancy cattle, with sales largely at from \$4.25 to \$4.85. There was a light traffic in stockers and feeders at from \$2.50 to \$1.70. Cows and helfers sold at from \$1.50 to \$2.85. Bulls sold mostly at from \$1.85 to \$2.85, and here was no change in calves. Texas cattle were unchanged and westerns were steady, with selfers, cows and steers selling largely at from 2.50 to 8150.
