REDUCTION BY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

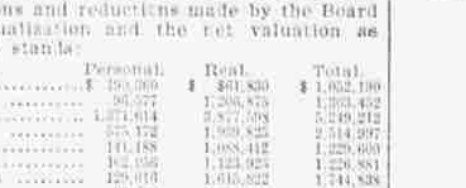
