A TOTAL TO THE REPORT OF THE PROPERTY. South Omaha News.

November 30 closed the thirteenth year's business of the Union Stock Yards company and at noon yesterday Secretary J. C. Sharp issued his annual report. Totals for the year show a large increase in the receipts of hogs and sheep and a slight decrease in cattle receipts, the reason for this decrease being the scarcity of cattle in Nebraska and Ing after some property.

The four great corn feeding states, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri, of which this point is the center, all look to this market for supplies of feeding cattle, as well as for a market for these same cattle as well as for a market for these same cattle after being finished. Cattle for feeding purposes are furnished in unlimited manuties by the great western and northwestern ranges, which also furnish the killers with vast numbers of fat cattle in the fall. Fully eighty acres are now covered with pens; barns, sheds and other buildings necessary for carrying on the business, while fully twenty acres have been graded and are rapidly being covered with pens and sheds. The whole is surrounded by a network of tracks and switches which are owned by the Stock Yards company. All of the stock, both coming in and out, as well as all of the stock yards and proxing house supplies, are handled by the packing house supplies, are handled by the yard company's own locomotives and train White the handling of cattle and hogs was

of the sheep industry was not overlooked, and the present year saw completed a sheep barn and dipping plant which has increased the sheep business fully \$60 per cent and added a large amount of territory to that already acquired. The barn accommodates 7,000 sheep, is a mammoth fireproof structure covering 39,000 square feet, where, under one roof are scales, sorting pens, com-plete feed station and everything necessary for the rapid transaction of business, the whole being paved with vitrified brick and well lighted. The dipping plant was erected in conformity with requirements of the United States Department of Agriculture and is complete in all its details. At a nominal cost the feeder can have his purchase made secure from disease and the success of this arrangement has been amply verified by the large increase in the inquiry at this point from all over the eorn beit for feeding stock, and by the large numbers of sheep of this description shipped in from the

ranges of the west.

The supply of water for the use of both the supply of water for the use of both the yards and the packing houses is furnished from the city mains and is always adequate. Every pen is supplied with trough and hydrant, so that under no circumstances is stock at any time compelled to be moved No charge whatever is made for the up

of the yards and one charge for weighing, usually called yardsge, covers the whole cost to the shipper, no matter how long his stock may remain on the market, the weighins harge being collected only after stock is

the only expense incurred here is for such an amount of feel as may be given to the stock by order of the owner. From one small frame plant built for the Hammond company in 1881, the growth of the packing industries has fully kept pacwith the enlargement of the yards. At the present time four large brick and stone pack ing houses covering sixty acres are in oper-ation and give employment to 5,000 men. These packing houses have a daily capacity of 6,000 cattle, 18,000 hogs and 4,000 sheep. During the past year about 50 per cent of

The horse and mule market, although only having been in existence for five years, is rapidly forging to the front as one of the principal features of the market and has been remarkably successful from the start. The shortage of the cattle receipts for the year amounts to a little less than 32,000, whereas the shortage from Nebraska and Iowa alone is something like 40,000 in com-parison with 1895, which shows that the re-ceipts from competitive territory have increased over previous years. The shortage in Nebraska and Iowa is due to the poor crop

of 1894 and the consequent falling off in the number of young cattle. An increase of 153,489 hogs is shown from Nebraska, which is very satisfactory, an sheep show an increase of 33 per cent, th shipments coming largely from Wyoming South Dakota and Nevada. While the sheep receipts show a marked increase, the number slaughtered at this point is increased from 30 per cent of the receipts in 1895 to 55 per

cent of the receipts this year.

The records of feed cattle shipped out into the state during the fall months, or during the time range cattle are coming to this market, compare very favorably with the fall of 1893, which was the best year in the history of the stock yards, the shipments being only 14,000 head less than in 1893. This falling of this year is directly traccable to the stringency of the money market, which was caused by the uncertainty of the result of the presidential election. Had this not been the case, the feeder shipments would
