The marvelous growth of Omalia compelled the reconstruction and enlargement of 000,000 and they would have been con- the water works plant at a cost of several millions and the expenditure of several hundred thousand dollars will the demands of the people who depend upon it. On the other hand the city has hydrants from 250 to 1,400, so that at the present rental it pays about \$85,000 or 4 per cent on \$2,200,600 exclusive of rentals paid by South Omaha. The private consumption of water has lacreased proportionately and far beyond original expectations.

Granting that the water company's franchise has not been forfeited by reason of its receivership and foreclosure sale, it becomes a question how much the city shall exact in return for the proposed seven-year extension and the waiver of its right to purchase the plant before 1907, and at only five-year periods thereafter. Manifestly the object of the water company is to secure a contract that will enable its new owners to dispose of bonds to pay off the floating debt and raise money for improvements. To do this they want ten years of guaranteed income and undisturbed possession. For this concession it is proposed to require them to supply 150 additional fire bydrants at nominal cost to the city. No concession is made, however, as to charges for private water supply nor is any reduction asked by the council committee in the rental of hydrants now in use or to be used if more than the 150 new

gally Trafficking in Dead Bodies. NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Morgue Keeper Andrew White, arrested for the illegal sale of unclaimed corpses, admitted today that he had engaged in the traffic in bodies but declared that it was permissible under

Bodies had been sold at an average of \$5 apiece. About 100 unclaimed bodies are transferred annually from the morgue to the medical institutions of the city, and must be done under the supervision of the superintendent of Bellevue, otherwise transfer constitutes a felony, punishable by not more than five years in state prison or \$1,000 fine, or both.
