He continued to be ill until the 1st of December, when he died.

THURSTON TALKS ON CUBA

Says the Condition There is a Blot on Modern Civilization.

Recognition Likely to Lead to War. Senator Declines He Will Vote for It until Full Knowledge of the Consequences Financial and Moral is Obtained.

An audience of more than two hundred persons assembled at the First Methodist church last night to hear Senator John M. Thurston discuss the Cuban question. The address was one of the series of talks on five questions which form a feature of the weekly meetings of the Chautauque circle.

The senator discussed Cuba from the standpoint of one who had fully made up his mind what the situation called for. In beginning he announced his intention to vote for the recognition of Cuban independence at the next session of the senate, but his speech gave the impression that he would be a little disappointed if that action failed to bring on a war. He declared that he did not think there was anything wrong with the present situation. As he said by an Omaha preacher, "war is God's thunderstorm which clears the atmosphere. All through history war has been the most potent factor in bringing about progress."

Referring to Cuba, the speaker said that the situation was a blot on the civilized world and a reproach to every American citizen. This condition called for patriotic action by every citizen of the United States. He said that the Cuban question was one of the most important of the day.

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Christian Hertz Tires of This World and Its Disappointments.

THINKS HIS LIFE HAS BEEN A FAILURE

Makes Deliberate Preparations, Disposes of His Body and Earthly Effects and Then Lies Down to Await Coming of Death.

That suicides come by three is one of the convictions of the police, of coroners and of police reporters. That conviction, born of experience, has again received confirmation. The first of the series occurred last Thursday night when John Kilkenny killed himself on Douglas street.

The suicide was Christian Hertz, a Danish printer. He asphyxiated himself with gas at his boarding place, 835 South Nineteenth street. The house is run by A. P. and P. P. Miller. From conversations with his friends within the past few days there is no doubt but that the act of self-destruction was premeditated.

The suicide was discovered at 9 o'clock yesterday morning, by Joseph Dunn, who was living at the Miller house for the past six or eight weeks. The inmates had smelled gas for some time previous to that, but were unable to locate it. Dunn, however, found that it issued from Hertz's room at 817 or 818 West Center. The inmates had written a note and had the deceased dead in the room, which was almost overcome by the gas which rushed out. When the room had been purified Hertz was found in a dead position. He had been lying on his back, with his head under a chair.

Hertz had been deposited for some time past. Sunday he told Joseph Dunn that he was tired of living. It is stated that he had stated this to his wife, a married woman in Missouri, who was here frequently, and whom he met in amateur theatricals. He himself was well known in amateur theatrical circles.
