"The claim register found in the office, by reason of its awkward bulk, has per isted in falling to pieces, and by reason of its poor arrangement and much useless and statistical information, was soon found cumersome and unsuitable and has been discarded. It has been replaced, without cost to the county, by a simpler and more ractical volume. provides that certain official

bonds shall be filed and recorded in the county court. Heretofore these bonds have teen filed, but not recorded. About two years ago a bond record was prepared and all official and miscellaneous bonds from the carliest records have been recorded. "All marriage licenses issued prior to 892 were preserved by my predec unbound packages, which has made difficult the labor of finding the original papers and has frequently resulted in their loss. At the

cost of over a month's labor of almost the entire office force, these scattered licenses

have been collected, arranged chronologically

and bound in convenient volumes. This has enhanced their usefulness and reduced the labor of the office force by making them easier of access.
"The absence of convenient and complete dexes to administration, guardianship and adoption matters has heretofore seriously embarrassed the public. Complete and reliable indexes to there three classes of business have been made, and verified by comparison with every paper, fee book and index relative to them. The labor of their proparation occupied several months.

"Convenient and reliable indexes are now tied up in the defunct Globe Savings bank, kept for civil cases and marriage licenses, and that there was a cash balance on hand and the first complete index to condemnation matters is in process of preparation.

"To reduce the labor, and consequently few ordinance, which is now in the hands
