Wheat Makes a Further Drop on Heavy Liquidation. WEAK OPENING CABLES A LEADING CAUSE. Corn and Oats Each Register a Slight Advance, Acting Independently of the Leader—Provisions Weak.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—Wheat broke 1/2c again today, but made a partial recovery, closing at a decline of 1/2c for the session. Liquidation, started by the weak opening cables, was very heavy. Corn and oats opened independent of wheat for one or two minutes about 10:30, but were weak and declined 1/2c to 1c.

Wheat opened very weak, with buyers hard to find at or below the Tuesday's closing prices. May, which was weak, was bid and some sales were effected at 75c. After holding for about half an hour around 75c there was an accession of weakness and another severe and rapid break to 72c. The lowest price was recorded when trading started at 72c. The first half of the session, and commission houses were kept busy unloading wheat for the U. S. custom, but when the price advanced through prices started down the hill again and it was not until the close of the day that buyers began to assume respectable proportions that a genuine rally took place.
