Fourteenth Street Vinduct. The contract for furnishing the iron and steel work for the Union Pacific's new viaduct across South Fourteenth atreet was yesterday awarded to A. & P. Roberts, proprietors of the Pencoyd Iron works, Pen-Philadelphia, Ever since it became known that the Union Paeific would erect a large steel m. stir among the big iron manufacturers of the country to secure the contract. There were about twenty bids received from as many prominent firms, but that of the Clark street, Chicago, Quaker City firm was considerably lower than all other blds. The centract price was not given out.

In speaking of the contract yesterday Chief Engineer Pegram of the Union Pacific said: "The contract requires that the iron shall be delivered in Chicago before May 1. That will give it to us in time to use during May. By that time the masonry work will be completed and we shall be able to go right ahead with the iron work. The contract for the masonry work will be awarded within the next tew days. We shall not begin work, however, until we are able to start right in and push it through to com-pletion. Root, and was one of the parties against whom suit was brought during the stormy days of 1889-90. On that account there has always been a bad feeling between him and the present head officers, and on account of the head office being located at Fulton. The salary of A. W. Bastian as postmaster amounts to about \$3,600 a year. Should the head office be removed, the receipts of the postoffice would be cut down at least one-half and the salary of the postmaster would suffer a corresponding reduction, hence he can afford to spend \$400 or \$500 to delay the removal until the expiration of his term as ostmaster.
