THE REPORT OF THE PARTY OF THE PARTY. Bids for painting the two viaducts will be pened at the meeting of the city council tonight and it is understood that the contract is to be let. Considerable rivalry is expected, although up to last night only one old had been filed with the city clerk. It s estimated that the work will cost in the leighborhood of \$2,000.

Mayor Ensor has fixed up a little surprise or members of the council in the shape of a veto of the resolution passed at the last session, instructing the city attorney to confees judgment for \$3,000 in favor of the receivers of the American Water Works company. the last six months of 1895.
Another matter of imperiance which is on the state to come up is the scheme of locating five fire and police alarm boxes in different parts of the city at an annual cost of \$180. In case this plan is accepted the telephone company will erect the street booths, put in a long distance transmitter and a matallia alemit and a metalic circuit and maintain these boxes for \$3 a month a piece, making \$36 a year for each booth and a total of \$180 for the year to each boots and a total of \$180 for the five. It is proposed to use these telephones for police and fire calls only, and to locate the boxes in sections of the city where there are neither telephones or fire alarm boxes. It costs the city about \$150 for every fire alarm box in use, and many of those now in service are of the old interstate pattern and cactically worthless. In cold weather those oxes stick, and the alarm is not sent in cor-ectly. Constant testing and repairing is necessary to keep these toxes in working order, and then it is not possible to do so in extremely cold weather, as was demonstrated during the recent cold snap. By the pro-posed plan, the city would gain five fire alarm boxes at a very low rate, and by continual use would be kept constantly in repair Councilman Franck of the Second ward i the originator of this plan, and will urg ts adoption.

An agent of the Mississippi Valley Tele shone company was in the city yesterday so iciting subscribers and managed to interesulte a number of people in the proposed new company. According to the premise made by the agent, the present telephone charges will be reduced 30 per cent, which, if the deal goes through, would make the price of telephones in business places \$2.80 a month and residences \$1.75 per month. It is un-derstood that those interested in the new company will apply to the proposed of the precompany will apply to the city council for a franchise. The franchise now held by the Nebraska Telephone company is not exclu-sive, and there would be nothing in the way of another company obtaining a franchise

here.
At the present time 150 telephones are in ise in South Omaha and the business house are charged \$4 a month and residences \$2.50 a month. This rate is a reduction of one-balf that formerly charged, the company about a year ago voluntarily reducing the

rates. In a number of cities in the United States at the present time a telephone war is on and the subscriber gets the worst of it for the reason that he is compelled to keep two elephones in his house or place of business nd the cost equals, if not exceeds, the charge usually made by the Bell telephone people. 
