An addition to chapter xciv provides for the prection and maintenance of public scales in each township or precinct of the state and for the appointment of township or precinct weighmasters. In such ases the township board appoints the weighnaster and fixes the fees to be charged for weighing. ment. Code have been entirely repealed and a new aw enacted regarding the selling of tobac to minots. The new law provides: That hereafter no person or persons in this state shall sell, give away, or furnish any cigarette or cigarette paper in any form whatever to any minor under the age of 21. Any person violating the provisions of this law shall be desmed guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of not less than \$100 and not to exeed \$200 and costs of prosecution. CRUELTY TO CHILDREN.

A new section of the Criminal Code defines ruelty to children. The new law provides that it shall be unlawful, and declared to be cruelty to children, for any person having the care, custody or control of any child or chiliren under the age of 14 years to willfully bandon, cruelly or unlawfully punish, or willfully or negligently deprive of necessary food, clothing or shelter such child or chil-dren. It is also made unlawful for any person employing or having the care, custody or ontrol of any child to permit the such child to be endangered or the health of the child to be injured, or willfully permit such child to be placed in such a situation that its life or health may be thus endangered, or to cause or permit such child to be overworked, cruelly beaten, tortured, tornented or mutilated. Any legally porated humane society or society for the prevention of cruelty to children may become the guardian of minor children in aclaw applicable to the guardianship of minors

RELATING TO IMPURE VINEGAR. A new subdivision to the Criminal Code, to the one devoted to the oleomargarine act, is designed to regulate the manufacture and sale of vinegar. No one in this state shall manufacture for sale, sell or deliver or have in his possession with intent to sell or deliver any vinegar not in compliance with the provisions of the law. No vinegar shall be sold as apple, orchard or cider vinegar not made exclusively of apple cider. Every person manufacturing or selling any of the so-called grain vinegar, wine vinegar or fruit vinegars shall place them on the market without artificial coloring, with a brand or label on such barrel or cask, clearly indicat-ing the name and place of business of the manufacturing person or firm, with the name of the grain or fruit from which the contents are made. The county attorney is charged with the enforcement of the law.

Another law coming under the same subdivision regulates in a similiar manner the manufacture and sale of cider.

NEW GAME LAW. The true sportsmen of the state will be interested in the provicions of a new law for the protection of wild game. The new law is very complete in its provisions and can hardly be summarized within a single paragraph. The time during which the several kinds of wild game may not be killed is included in the following: Elk, deer or antelope, between January 1 and November 1.


