### GENERAL MANAGER BABCOCK RESIGNS

Differs with the Directors as to the Conduct of Affairs, Refuses to Change His Policy and Gets Out.

W. N. Babcock, general manager of the Union Stock yards, South Omaha, sent his resignation to President Paxton and the directors of the company yesterday morning. In speaking about the matter Mr. Babcock said he had offered his resignation to the directors, but as yet it had not been acted upon. He did not know whether it would be accepted or not. The reason he said for this move on his part was that differences existed as to the policy to be pursued in the management of the yards. Some of the directors had offered him not exactly like the policy he was pursuing, and he declined to request him to make radical changes in the management. He had in a measure refused to change the policy he had outlined, and as they could not come to any agreement he had concluded to settle the matter by sending in his resignation.

### SOUTHERNERS APPLYING FOR SPACE

Alabama is Preparing to Exhibit the Many Products of Its Rich Mines and Its Vast Forests.

The Department of Exhibits of the exposition has received a most flattering application for space in the Mines and Mining and the Forestry buildings from an unexpected source. The special committee appointed in accordance with this resolution writes that the state will make a liberal exhibit and asks that the department will accept the position in the rules of the department, and for other data in connection with exhibits. It is stated that the exhibit will be made up of iron ores, bauxite, granite, sandstone, dolomite, limestone, iron pyrites, copper and gold. The exhibit will also include a full geological and forestry exhibit.

### KNOW NOTHING OF ANY GAMBLING.

Ignorance of Witnesses in Case of the American and Cummins.

The case in which the Municipal League of South Omaha is proceeding against Jack Morrison and Robert Cummings on the charge of keeping a gambling house over the saloon at Twenty-fifth and N streets, South Omaha, was on trial before Judge Baxter yesterday morning, and about a dozen witnesses were examined, but so far as making a case against the defendants was concerned, the trial was decidedly farcical.

The first witness was J. A. Harvey, the proprietor of the saloon over which the alleged gambling room was located. He testified that there had been two or three tables in the rooms which were used to play high-five and low-five. They had seen white play for drinks, but had seen no gambling, nor was he aware that Morrison or Cummings had anything to do with the rooms.

L. A. Scott and Leroy Davis said they had been in the rooms several times, but had seen no gambling devices except two or three tables and chairs. They had seen white play for drinks, but had seen no gambling, nor was he aware that Morrison or Cummings had anything to do with the rooms.

A half dozen other witnesses, including the two constables who made the arrest, testified that they had seen no gambling, nor were they aware that Morrison or Cummings had anything to do with the rooms.

The trial was then continued till 2 o'clock, at which time the assistant county attorney announced that there seemed to be no further evidence, and he dismissed the case.

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### TRIAL GOES OVER FOR ONE WEEK.

State Not Ready to Proceed with the Bennett Libel Case.

The preliminary hearing of Theodore Bennett, charged with libeling E. E. Howell by calling him an A. P. A. during the late city campaign, did not continue at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning in police court as had been intended. When the case was called, it developed that Assistant County Attorney Winter, who is one of the counsel in behalf of the state, was not on hand. As a consequence the defense demanded a continuance for a week and got it. The hearing is to be taken up again on Thursday, June 3, at 9:30 o'clock.

Attorney Shoemaker, who is assisting in the prosecution, is hardly satisfied with the manner in which the case is progressing. He is not pleased particularly with Judge Gordon's ruling in not allowing witnesses to be called to testify that they did not vote for Howell because they heard that the majority candidate was an A. P. A. The state relied on such testimony to show that the charge against Howell was not true. It is therefore considered that the absence of the county attorney this morning was a serious blow to the prosecution, which to complete additional plans of execution.

### FARMER MLEYNEK HAS SUSPICIONS.

Has an Idea that He May Be Killed.

Barclay Mleynek, a Bohemian farmer whose home is about two miles from Yale, Ia., is being detained at the police station on an apparently well-grounded suspicion that he is mentally deranged. The city physician examined him yesterday and discovered indications of insanity. The man's relatives are to be notified of his condition.

The man was taken into custody yesterday morning at the Union depot. He came in from Gordon, Ia., and tried to buy a ticket to Oklahoma City. The most suspicious act of which he was guilty was in trying to give away his money. When the police got hold of him, however, he still had about \$20 in his possession.

The prisoner, who is about 55 years of age, says that he has left his home because his two sons at Yale wanted to kill him Wednesday to get possession of his 120 acres of land. He gave each of them forty acres. He says he is on his way to Oklahoma City to the home of another son.
