

MARTIAL LAW RULES

Sheriff Lowry Patrols Three Townships with His Deputies.

DOES NOT ALLOW THE MINERS TO MARCH

Awaits Action of the Court Before Ordering Camps Broken Up.

TWENTY-TWO EVICTIONS AT PLUM CREEK

Several Men Who Seek De Armit's Life Placed Under Arrest.

WOMEN ATTEMPT A DEMONSTRATION

Yell at Miners Who Are Still at Work and Threaten to Throw Bricks at Them—Drown Satisfied.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 17.—Martial law has been declared in Plum, Patton and Wilkins townships by Sheriff Lowry.

The sheriff will not attempt to break up the camp of the strikers until a court has passed on the question, but announced today that he is determined to stop the marching and trespassing on the company's property.

There are now nearly 800 men in the camp at Plum creek. After the military at Sandy Creek leaving the camp at that point was abandoned and the men went to Plum Creek.

There were twenty-two evictions near Plum Creek during the day. Passengers on the morning train from Pittsburg to Turtle Creek say a man who gave his name as George

The strike leaders for some reason have abandoned their plan to meet at the heads of the different labor organizations to devise ways and means of battling with an adverse ruling of the court.

At Turtle Creek fifty strikers, without leaders or music, and with nothing at their hands, gathered for a meeting.

While the men were going to work this morning they had to pass between two rows of French women, headed by Mrs. Jennie De Armit.

President Dolan said he was acquitted of any intention of setting off a strike, but did not intend to say anything on the subject.

The contemplated plan to have the women make marches, which was to have been inaugurated today, has been definitely dropped.

The farmers of the entire country surrounding the striking town are making extensive preparations for a demonstration to show their sympathy for the strikers.

BANKERS IN CONVENTION

Opening of the Annual Gathering Occurs at Detroit.

GOV. PINOREE WELCOMES THE DELEGATES

Advances Some of His Characteristic Ideas Concerning Corporations—Many Women Look on as Interested Spectators.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 17.—The banking interests of the country were well represented this morning, when about 650 delegates to the American association assembled in the Detroit opera house to attend the opening session of the twenty-third annual session of that body.

After a conference this evening between the sheriff and the strike leaders the latter are convinced that the sheriff's latest order forbidding the strikers to march is a violation of the law.

Every seat in the Detroit opera house was occupied this morning, and a little after 11 o'clock President Robert J. Lowry called to order the twenty-fourth annual convention of the American Bankers' association.
