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CRISIS IN THE COAL STRIKE.

The failure of the operators and striking coal miners to reach an agreement in the conference at Pittsburgh on Tuesday and the determination of both parties to continue the struggle brings the strike to a crisis from which there is reason to apprehend serious results.

The operators in the Pittsburgh district having resolved that there is no course open but to continue the conflict, will, it is announced, take steps to open the mines.

The strikers will be notified that they can return to work if they wish to and if they do not other men will be employed.

The spirit manifested by the strikers there seems to be small probability that any considerable number of them will accept an offer to resume work in the event of the operators securing any considerable number of men to take their places.

In its present aspect the situation certainly appears grave and it is to be hoped that a way may yet be found to avert the danger which must be obvious to all concerned and to effect a settlement of what has already been a very costly conflict.
