Two School Boards Trying to Do Business in Avery District.

CALL IN THE ASSISTANCE OF THE COURT

Members of the Old Board and Its Tenchers Driven Out of One School by Use of Force.

There is all kinds of trouble in the Avery school district and if some one don't get into contempt of court before two boards of directors settle their differences it will be funny. A new board of directors, alleging to have been legally elected, is struggling for supremacy over the ousted members of the eld board. William Smith was a director in school district No. 5, and, acdistrict and asserts that his time is not out for a year yet. The term of John Clinton, moderator, has expired. In order to get rid of William Smith the new members concluded to change to a high school district which could be done by a majority vote of the directors present at a meeting, thereby enabling them to elect a board of six trustees and relegate the board then in existence to

Without first determining by the requisite procedure to change to a high school district the new directors proceeded to elect a board of six trustees. William Smith has been a director in the Avery school district for forty years and he objected to being legis-lated out of office. The old board had engaged the teachers for the fall and winter before the new directors session elected. When the change was made and old man Smith was declared ousted, new teachers were selected and the war commenced. Last Monday morning the old board, in company with the teachers employed by it, repaired to the school houses for the purpose of opening school. They found the doors and windows of the school building barricaded. A number of deputy constables were on guard, some of the friends of the new board having been sworn in as deputy constables by Justice Chandler who claims to be one of the members of the new board. Teachers and officers of the district were denied admission to the school houses and were compelled to withdraw.

DRIVE OUT THE TEACHERS.

Tuesday morning the old board and the teachers engaged by it succeeded in gaining admission to the school houses and the operation of teaching the young idea how to shoot was commenced. Peace did not hover over the locality long for, according to reports, the new board and followers to the number of a dozen or fifteen swooped down and ejected the teachers from the buildings. Further the teachers were threatened with arrest if they persist in their attempts to hold school. Finally the old board and the teachers were driven off the field with clubs and threats.
