General Weakness Follows the Government Report. Wheat Goes Down Nearly Two Cents. Corn Also Shows a Falling Off and Provisions Suffer Badly from a Reaction and a Virus of Yellow Fever Scare.

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—Everything traded in on the Board of Trade today was weak with the exception of a few articles which declined. Statistical news in wheat favored the bears for once, and they took advantage of that fact with a vengeance, pounding the price down to a point five below yesterday's closing. Corn declined for the same reason. Oats declined less. Provisions suffered from another large dose of yellow fever scare, pork declining 20c, lard 30c and ribs 15c.
