White Metal Again Declines in the World's Money Markets. NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Silver scored sharp decline today of %d to 251/2d in London and 11/2c to 541/2c in New York. The high price on the rally was reached on September 20, on which date the price was 27% d in London and 59% c in New York.

The low price of September was 23% d in London and 513c in New York. Commenting on the decline, the Evening Post says: "The chief reason for the renewed decline in silver since last week Tuesday is growing belief that the Bank of England's offer to 'water' its reserve with silver was made on the belief that the condition impoxed would render such action impossible. The price had been advanced on the publication of the bank directors' letter and was forced up further by a shortage in silver in London for immediate delivery. But this week's mail advices show that in the second week of September imports of silver at Lon-don exceeded exports by \$170,000. Moreover,
