Crisis at Madrid in Which the Ministry Tenders Its Resignation.

SAGASTA LIKELY TO HEAD NEW MINISTRY

Weyler's Recall and Autonomy for Cuba Will Probably Follow.

NEWS CAUSES A FLURRY AT WASHINGTON

Diplomats Discuss the Situation and Seem to Think Spain Will Hereafter Adopt a More Liberal Policy.

MADRID, Sept. 29.—The Spanish cabinet has resigned.

The queen has accepted the cabinet's resignation, but has asked General Azarraga to continue in office until a solution of the crisis is found.

Her majesty will summon the leaders of the various parties and the presidents of the chambers tomorrow to consult as to the situation.

Senor Sagasta has been telegraphed for and it is believed that the liberal leader will be asked to form a cabinet.

The ministry whose resignation has just been announced was constituted as follows:

Prime Minister and Minister for War—General Marcello de Azarraga.

Minister for Foreign Affairs—The duke of Tetuan.

Minister of Marine—Rear Admiral Don Jose M. Beranger.

Minister of Commerce and Agriculture—Don Aurelio Rivero.

Minister for the Colonies—Don Thomas Castellano.

Minister for the Home Department—Don Fernando Cos-Gay.

United States Minister Woodford, the duke of Tetuan and the president of the senate, the Marquis Foz de la Terrada held a conference today and General Woodford presented to General Azarraga the members of the United States delegation.

Owing to the cabinet crisis the Cuban parliaments have been postponed.

It is said that Senor Sagasta is in favor of superseding Captain General Weyler and of granting autonomy to Cuba immediately.

Senor Zamora will probably be minister of foreign affairs in the new cabinet.

SAGASTA'S OPINIONS.

On August 12 last it was announced that Senor Sagasta had made a fresh declaration on the political situation.

He said affairs were really growing worse in Cuba and continued serious in the Philippine islands.

He added that a liberal ministry would be ready to apply to Cuba, and that the main policy would be to restore the Cuban constitution.

He said the uprising instead of dying out was spreading considerably.

In conclusion he said: "In my opinion the Cortes will meet, if they do meet their existence is ephemeral.

Regarding the United States and Spain the liberal minister refused to express himself.

FOUR DEATHS FROM FEVER

Quartet Succumbs to the Yellow Scourge at New Orleans.

WARMER WEATHER CAUSES IT TO SPREAD

Twenty-Six New Cases Reported During Past Twenty-Four Hours—Quarantine Regulations Evaded by Many Citizens.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 29.—Four deaths and twenty-six new cases in the yellow fever record for today, exceeding in number the cases of any day since the scourge first made its appearance in the city.

There are various reasons given for the spread of the disease, but the principal ones are two—that the weather turned warm again and owing to the much wider field to cover the Board of Health has had more difficulty in getting every house as closely guarded as possible.

Fire and Police Commission Cuts Off the Heads of Patrolmen.

ACTION IN THE INTEREST OF ECONOMY

Chief Gallagher Recommends Twenty-Two for Dismissal from the Force, but the Commission Spares Six.

Sixteen officers and patrolmen were discharged from the police department by the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners at a special meeting last night.

The list of those dropped is as follows: Sergeants Mitchell and Chamberlain, Detectives Hemming and Cox, Patrolmen Shop, Wilber, Dibern, Dillard, Godola, Rector, J. Leary, Burr, J. Thomas, Luke, Kirk and Hoff.

The order takes effect on and after September 30. The discharges were prefaced by a resolution in which it was stated that the men were dismissed on account of the condition of the police fund.

It was set out that if the force was continued on its present basis, an overlap exceeding the sum of \$3,400 would be created, which would be wholly unauthorized under the laws controlling the commission.
