

Death of a Printer.

News was received here yesterday of the death of Dwight Haggerty at Auburn, Neb. Mr. Hagerty was one of the oldest pressmen and printers in the city and was employed here for many years. She was not veto advised of his serious illness until a day or two before his death. He was a member of the Odd Fellows, Woodmen of the World and Modern Woodmen, and the notification of his deith was received through these lodges here yesterday. Arrangements have been made to have the body brought here for burial.




