MACHINE MANAGERS TRADING FOR VOTES

All Other Candidates Are Turned Down in the Hope of Pulling Hector and Redfield Through.

WHILE LESS THAN TWO WEEKS REMAIN BEFORE THE NOVEMBER ELECTION THE CAMPAIGN IS PROGRESSING QUIETLY.

No large meetings have been held and there is an absence of the crowds of partisan statesmen that usually congregated on the street corners during the closing weeks of a campaign.
