Bears Take Hold of the Market and Retain Control for the Day.

ALL GRAINS SUFFER IN CONSEQUENCE

Reports Were Strongly of the Bull Order, but Had Little Influence Upon the Market.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—The local talent in the wheat pit spread itself today, and being against the market, prices broke. There was a strongly marked undercurrent of bearish feeling permeating the crowd, and although some of the day's statistical developments were of a more bullish character than have been recently furnished, they had little influence upon the market, which closed at a loss of 1/2c per bush in May, but of 1/4c in December. Corn and oats were also weak, closing 1/4c lower respectively. Provisions were very dull and closed substantially unchanged.

Wheat had a weak opening, principally because Liverpool fully reflected the decline of the day before. Chicago, it opened at 1/4c below the previous day, but at the same time was reported somewhat higher for the day. Northwest buyers were still too busy to show much interest.

The most important consideration for the time, however, was the hostile attitude of the market against some of the heavyest of the local speculators. That was important because of the almost total absence of the market from the outside. The opening price for May was 99 1/2c, a decline of 1/2c from yesterday, and it declined to 99c at the close. December, however, was much weaker, opening at 97 1/2c and declining to 97c. The market for wheat was very dull and closed at 97c for May and 97 1/2c for December.
