

UNIVERSITY REGENTS TODAY

Present Board Will Convene in Its Last Regular Session.

MEMBER HADLEY PAYS THE PENALTY

His Failure to Make a Fuss Over Wolfe Last Spring Costs Him the Support of the Populists.

LINCOLN, Dec. 6.—(Special.)—The December meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska, to be held tomorrow, will be the last meeting of the board as now constituted.

With the end of the year two regents, Messrs. Kaley and Hadley, will retire and their places will be taken by Reginald Van Fleet and Knower. Mr. Kaley is a Republican, having been elected five years ago to fill an unexpired term. He had previously served upon the Normal School board. Mr. Hadley, on the other hand, is a populist. So that the retirement of these two regents in favor of the fusion candidates deprives the Republicans of only one member of the board. As the board now stands divided with four Republicans and two fusionists, the loss of this vote will make the board evenly divided between the Republicans and their opponents.

MOORE'S SENTENCE IS SUSPENDED

This afternoon Willis Reed, one of the attorneys of Eugene Moore, presented the application for a suspension of the sentence of the defendant in the case of Moore vs. State. Reed made a short argument in support of the application, setting up the ground for a claim of error that the law which required the bond in the case of Moore was unconstitutional, which required all fees to be paid into the state treasury.

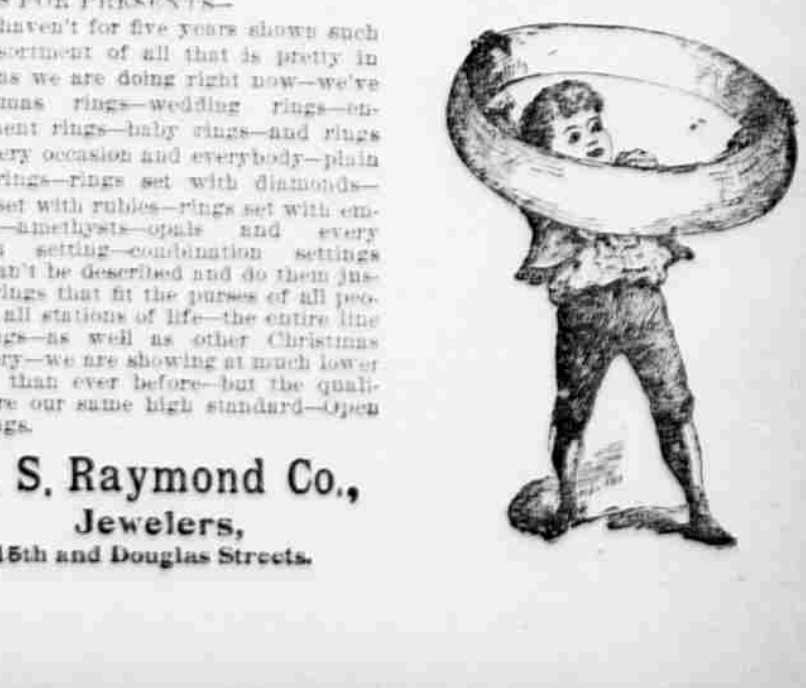
