

ARRESTED FOR KIDNAPING A BOY New York Lawyer Found Working

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 15 .- Albert S. Warner, the Albany, N. Y., lawyer arrested at Riley, Kan., charged with implicity in the kidnapping of young Conway at Albany, N. Y., last August, was brought to Kansas City this morning and will remain at the city jail until requisition papers shall arrive from New York. Warner was found on a farm belonging to a man named Goodrich, three miles from Riley. After a chase of nearly four months in Georgia, Tennessee, Minnesota and New Mexico, he was run to earth by Joseph Mc-Cann of the Albany detective force, torether with a Pinkerton detective named Thomas. 


