The statutes of the state expressly provide how a widow may be lawfully barred of dower in the lands of owhich her husband cled seized and this bar is made to depend upon her voluntary act.

2. The lands of an intestate descend to his heirs, subject to his unsecured debts. But his widow's dower estate in such lands is not encumbered with such debts.

3. The lands of a husband during his life are subject to his wife's inchoate right of dower therein, and at the instant of his death intestate the law transmutes the inchoate dower lien into an absolute dower estate, subtracts it from the lands of the intestate and vests the right thereto in his widow.

4. The sale of the lands of his intestate by an administrator, made in pursuance of a license therefor to pay debts allowed against his estate, does not of listelf, divest the widow's dower estate in such lands.

5. A sale of lands by an administrator to pay the debts of his intestate is a judiclassic; and the doctrine of caveat emptor applies to a purchaser thereat.

6. Where the record of a proceeding, which resulted in a district court's licensing an administrator to sell the lands of his intestate discloses that such intestate left a widow, this is, of itself, notice to a purchaser at such sale of such widow's dower estate in such lands.

7. A widow, made party to a proceeding by her husband's administrator to sell the lands of which he died selzed to pay debts allowed against his estate, does not estop herself from claiming her dower estate in the lands so have the received a part of the proceeds of such sale as her "distributive share of such estate;" such payment not having her made to nor received by her in lieu of her dower estate in such lands.

#### THE "JOHNNY LAW."

The Tennessee Law to Prevent Flirting with School Girls.

There is no queerer legislative vagary on the statute books of any of the states than what is known as the "Johnny law" passed by the last Tennessee assembly, and now being enforced in that state. The law was passed, says the New Orleans Times, for the restraint and humiliation of juvenile lovers, as if "sparking the girls" had not been a recognized and altogether legitimate pastime with the youthful section of the male popula-tion from the days of Father Adam until now. An act for the protection of boarding schools and colleges for females, and the principals and inmates thereof.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the general assembly of the state of Tennessee. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to willfully and unnecessarily interfere with, disturb, or in any way disquiet the pupils of any school or college for females in this state, or the principals or teachers in charge of them, while on any public road or street, or in any building or structure, or on the school premises; nor shall any communication be had for such purpose with such pupils or any of them, either orally or in writing, or by signs or otherwise; and it shall also be unlawful for any person to enter upon any such school or college premises except on business, without first having obtained permission from the principa! in charge of same; and every per-son guilty of either of said offenses shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction thereof, shall pay a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50 for each offense on first conviction; and upon second and each subsequent conviction of a like offense shall pay a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, and be imprisoned at the discretion of the court, in the county fail not less than ten nor more than thirty cays Section 2. Be it further enacted. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to leiter, wander, stand or sit upon the public

pass along the same in such manner and with intent to annoy, vex or disturb the owners or occupants of premises used for school or college purposes for education of females. Any person violating the second section shall be deemed gully and shall be fixed and punished as in the first section. Passed on March 17, 1897.
