BEARS MAKE A RAID UPON THE MARKET

Leiter, by Heavy Buying, Succeeds in Getting Control Again, and May Wheat Closes at Stendy Prices.

CHICAGO, March 11.-It looked for few minutes in the wheat pit today that such a flurry would ensue that it might sweep the big buils off their feet. What appeared to be an organized raid was made on May, brokers offering that option at prices 460 c under what Leiter brokers were bidding for it, but refusing to sell to the latter at less than the Leiter bid prices. July broke 2c in the excitement and continued weak to the end, closing at a loss of 1%c. Leiter, by heavy buying, finally got the market under control and succeeded holding the May price at yesterday's figure, \$1.04. The market was a vicious one for a time. Coarse grains showed a good deal of steadiness in the face of the wheat break and lost only he of their previous values. Provisions, starting strong, became

weak and closed 2½67½c lower. The start in wheat was quite firm, July opening We higher at 90%@90%c and May We higher at \$1.04%. There was a falling off in the volume of Argentine shipments and this was apparently the only reason for the slight advance. No great amount of wheat was offered and very little demand existed was offered and very little demand existed for the first few minutes and the market remained about at a standstill for that time. Then it commenced to drop, slowly at first, under statistical news. Liverpool receipts the last three days were slightly in excess of normel requirements. The most disturbing element was the big addition to the stock of contract wheat here. Chicago receipts were 55 cars today, 19 of which were of contract quality. Besides this 64 cars and 18,000 bu. No. 1 northern were transferred from unifcensed houses. The continuance of the heavy contract receipts from irregular gources began to have effect on traders and the unusual heaviness of today's receipts resulted in an almost total withdrawal of support sortly after the opening. Prices in consequence began gradually to decline. No very great selling pressure was put on the market, however, until the price had got to about 53½c. Leiter brokers were, as usual, giving support to May, bidding \$1.04. Then apparently an organized raid was made on May. 
