

Comparing the inward and outward trade, we have an excess of exports over imports last month amounting to \$53,100,000, while for the same time of last year the surplus of exports was only \$13,500,000. The extra-ordinary balance of trade in our favor thus continues to increase without any abate-ment. We have made a net import of gold during the month amounting to \$29,500,000; but that was largely due to bills of ex-change drawn against exports of previous months and held back for temporary in-vestment.


